Statement of intent

Vision Statement

Statement of Intent

At William Stukeley CE Primary School, we use our Pupil Premium Grant funding to provide additional educational support to our disadvantaged pupils to improve their progress and to raise their standard of achievement.

Our Ultimate Objectives

We recognise that disadvantaged children can face a wide range of barriers which may impact on their learning. Our ultimate objectives are to therefore:

- Remove barriers to learning created by poverty, family circumstance and background
- Narrow the attainment gaps between disadvantaged pupils and their non-disadvantaged peers
- Ensure ALL pupils can read fluently and with good understanding
- Develop confidence in their ability to communicate effectively in a wide range of contexts
- Enable pupils to look after their social and emotional wellbeing and to develop resilience
- Access a wide range of experiences to develop their knowledge and understanding of the world
- To support families, beyond the classroom

Achieving our Ultimate Objectives

To achieve our objectives and overcome identified barriers to learning we will:

- Provide all staff with high quality CPD to ensure that pupils access effective quality first teaching
- Provide targetted intervention and support to quickly address identified gaps in learning including the use of small group work and 1:1 tuition

- Target funding to ensure that all pupils have access to trips, residential, first-hand learning experiences
- Provide opportunities for all pupils to participate in enrichment activities including sport and music
- Provide appropriate nurture/additional support to enable pupils to access learning within and beyond the classroom
- Provide appropriate social and emotional support

Key Principals

We will ensure that effective teaching, learning and assessment meets the needs of all pupils through the rigorous analysis of data.

Class teachers will identify specific intervention and support for individual pupils which will be reviewed termly.

Alongside academic support, we will ensure that those pupils who have social, emotional and mental health needs will access high quality provision from appropriately trained adults.

Part B: Review of the previous academic year

Outcomes for disadvantaged pupils

Disadvantaged children make good progress against their peers in RWM across the school. The employment of a specialist teaching assistant for EAL and Speech and Language has ensured that these children make good progress and gaps in learning are identified quickly and intervention put in place.

Intervention is planned carefully to support all pupils including those disadvantaged. This is effective through the employment of high quality teaching assistants and first quality teaching. Regular internal assessments ensure pupils gaps in learning are identified quickly and steps put into place at an early stage.

Funding has been used effectively to support the development of reading within the school through additional resources and specific reading programmes. The impact is shown in the internal data of the school.

Funding is used to support families where appropriate to ensure all children are able to access clubs including breakfast, after school and enrichment activities. The funding also supports disadvantaged families with trips and residential.

Funding has also been used effectively to support health and well being of disadvantaged children through workshops delivered by the Stay Safe Partnership, training for staff working alongside specific pupils, and employment of a pastoral mentor within the school.

MSA staff training on effective lunchtime practice has seen a greater involvement of children engaging in play and developing good social skills.
